where his father, John Freeman, was attending the University of Notre Dame. The family moved back to Alabama in 1975, where Scott would spend his childhood with his sister, Stacia, and his brother, Landon. Scott attended Oakman Elementary and High School from 1980-1992. He participated in both basketball and football in high school, and lettered four years in basketball and three in football. Under Coach Hosea Collins, as a sophomore, Scott played on the undefeated 1989 Oakman High School football team. He made All-County for two years and All-State for one year, and in his senior year, Scott was the Daily Mountain Eagle defensive Player of the Year.

Not only did Scott excel on the playing field, but he also earned high honors as a student graduating 3rd in the Oakman High School class of 1992. This combination of athletic and academic excellence earned him a place at the University of Pennsylvania to play football and to study electrical engineering.



Scott played college football for the University of Pennsylvania Quakers under head coach, Al Bagnoli from 1992-1996. He began on the freshman team as defensive tackle, then moved to right offensive tackle, where he lettered as a varsity player for the remaining three years. During Scott's time at Penn the team won two Ivy League championships and went undefeated in the 1993 and 1994 season. Scott was voted by his coaches as the Most Improved Offensive Player in his sophomore year. In his senior year, he was awarded the Edge Church Memorial Award, for which teammates selected the senior athlete who has contributed most to the team. Also as a senior, he earned All-Ivy League Honorable Mention. Scott looks back fondly on the camaraderie he shared with his teammates and on the firm encouragement he received from his coaches in those four years at the UPenn.

Scott graduated with a Bachelors of Science in Electrical Engineering from the University of Pennsylvania. After graduation, he remained in Philadelphia, married his wife, Becky in 2003, and is raising his two children, Josiah (age 13) and Natalie (age 9). He enjoys a career in automation engineering.
